BLACK SUMMER IN THE HILLS

On the 20th December 2019 the Adelaide Hills residents woke to harrowing news of a bushfire that had sparked in the Mount Lofty Ranges.

During catastrophic fire conditions and heat waves reaching above 40 degrees, the fire began in Cudlee Creek after a tree fell on power-lines.

Initially the fire headed in a south-easterly direction towards Lobethal and Lenswood, the following morning the monstrous fire took a new direction following a north-north-easterly wind change pushing the fires toward Birdwood and areas as far as Harrogate and Brukunga.

One resident of the Adelaide Hills recalls his close encounter with the fire when it first began.

Lawrie Balydon recalls driving through the Adelaide Hills toward Cudlee Creek at roughly 10am with his son when out of nowhere a police officer drove in front of their path to stop them.

Hills motorists will enjoy lower car registration fees.

From 1 July 2020, some Hills motorists will enjoy lower car registration fees after changes were made to the CTP insurance district boundaries.

The change comes on top of a decision to allow motorists to choose their CTP insurer which has delivered savings of up to \$114 per private passenger vehicle.

Owners of private passenger vehicles in Hills towns including Charleston, Forreton, Gumeracha, Harrogate, Hay Valley, Kenton Valley, Lobethal, Mount Torrens, Nairne and Woodside (and several other townships not affected by the fire) have been moved to District 2 and will see a premium reduction of \$96 or 32%

"He ripped in front of us on the road and told us whether we like it or not we have to turn around, he said there is a huge fire in Cudlee Creek and the flames are approximately 15-20 feet above the trees, and that we're heading straight toward its path." He said. "He was in a state of emergency and panic and so were we once we heard that, we did not expect that at all and we did what he said, an immediately turned around, we didn't hear anything about the fire until he stopped us, we're very lucky he was there."

It was not long before the fire reached emergency level. Hundreds of brave CFS volunteers attended the blaze, more than 80 homes, 500 out buildings and hundreds of vehicles were damaged or destroyed.

A mass operation to locate and assist injured animals was underway once it was safe to do so to locate and assist thousands of injured or deceased animals.

Millions of wildlife pets and livestock animals were killed or seriously injured in the blaze, many wild animals were also seen on roads and in townships seeking shelter, food and water, many distressed and desperate with severe injuries and trauma.

Some animals acted out of desperation approaching residents with bottles of water and food ignoring usual instincts. Hundreds of residents' and wildlife volunteers gave a helping to assist the effected animals.

Crops were also largely affected by the fires including wineries and local produce farmers; this has also affected livelihood.

Engineer Ron Sealth, 69, a Charleston resident also sadly lost his life as he stayed to protect his home. He was discovered inside his home, which had been destroyed by the blaze.

He will be deeply missed by his friends and family and local residents. The family said in a statement "Some people give firm hugs – I don't know what's beyond firm, but that's what Dad occasionally delivered.

When he gave a hug he meant it." CFS volunteers said it was amazing that no one else was killed in the blaze.


The fire burnt some 25,000 hectares with over 200 individual fires burning at emergency level. Many fires were caused by embers carried by the wind, embers can travel quite far and cause spot fires, emergency crews warned of the danger to residents as far as kilometers away from the fires.

The fire was eventually contained on the 4th of January. Residents recalled that being the worst Christmas and start to the new year on record with some residents losing everything they owned.

However spirits were lifted by the generosity of other residents of Adelaide and the Adelaide Hills, with hundreds of donations and thousands of dollars raised for the south Australian Bush Fire Appeal which also assisted those affected in the kangaroo bush fires.

The government also assisted residents with grants and emergency payments. The date now marks six months after the fires and already the towns and affected areas are returning to normal.

Thank you messages for the CFS and emergency services are still erected around the towns, a reminder of how grateful residents are for the individuals risking their life to save others and their livelihoods. It's the determination and selflessness of these individuals that are the difference between life and death for everything in the path of the flame.

COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

David Leach- North Ward Councillor
Mount Barker District Council

The views in this article are my own personal opinion and are not those of the Mount Barker District Council.

Our Sunburnt Country.

Summer brought devastating fires, autumn, a virus that threatens our lives, community, jobs and economy. This North Ward, Mount Barker District Councillor wishes you all a safe winter and a return to the new normal as the weather warms up in spring.

We often complain about government and how it affects our lives, in the case of COVID-19 I am personally grateful for the three levels of government ensuring we did not go through what many other countries had to endure.

I pay my respect, on behalf of us all, to the health care workers, emergency services, retail, hospitality, service, transport, essential services and government workers who went to work every day and were exposed to a serious risk.

Council Money

Senior managers have recommended to Council in its draft budget that rates be 1% more than last year, which is in real terms, 1.2% less than last year, adjusted for the increased National Consumer Price Index to March 2020 of 2.2 %.

Council staff will work smarter, harder and collaboratively to deliver the same services with less "real" dollars per resident than before.

A few years back Council advanced a capital payment of \$1.5 million to the Heysen Trust to preserve and enhance the experience of people visiting the the home of Sir Hans Heysen, the Cedars, in Hahndorf.

A month or so ago Council, again, resolved to advance a further \$1.5 million to further develop this site to a world class centre of artistic excellence.

This significant amount of money along, with many more millions from personal and government grants, will deliver a significant asset to the district.

I particularly advocated for the second tranche of \$1.5 million to be repaid to Council from a portion of future Heysen Foundation profits.

While most of my fellow Councillors did not support this view, I am part of a collegiate, "cabinet" style of local government and while disagreeing with, am part of, that Council decision making process.

Council Rates

More than ever before, some residents are facing difficulty in paying their rates, I am giving a big shout out to Council rates staff, they understand many people are doing it tough, rates staff will treat each case with empathy and confidentiality, late fees and interest can be waived.

Council Plans

Council has endorsed the Brukunga and Harrogate Neighbourhood Plan, it is well worth a read and has encouraged discussion about what these two small, valued communities want and need.

As a result of these plans expect improvements around amenity, fire security, roads, infrastructure and social programs.

This plan is a road map, a living document, your comments and advice are encouraged, will be listened to and where resources allow, implementation will happen.

Staff are engaged investigating/implementing our Disability Action Plan, Long Term Financial plan, Callington and Kanmantoo Town Plans, a proposal for a dog park near Nairne (away from houses), the proposed aquatic and leisure facility, future waste water treatment plant capital expenditure and proposed Mount Barker town centre development.

Council Facilities and Community Project

Mick Murphy Park is about to go from orange to green on Senior Strategic Planner Kristian's project planning spreadsheet. If the delivery is anywhere near the energy Kristian has put into consultation and planning you can expect a fantastic "new" park, more than fit for purpose.

Byethorne Park has exceeded expectations, expect a couple of connecting trails very soon.

Council staff have increasingly taken over parks and reserves maintenance in preference to contractors, I am hearing from locals about better service delivery lately.

If you see a Council worker hard at it, please, spend ten seconds to thank her/him. They take pride in their jobs. We would live in a dreary old town without Council staff making the place cleaner, functional and brighter.

NDRA and Nairne Fire Support

Jade, Kirsten, a host of volunteers and businesses stepped into a void immediately after the fire. There were a lot of people that would have gone without food and drinks during and after the crisis and ongoing COVID19. Respect.

Flint Community Care

Flint Community Care, formerly known as Nairne Fire Support have recently changed their name to reflect their growing support in the Adelaide Hills community.

The volunteer run organisation, founded and lead by selfless and community minded Jade Brook, initially started as a response to help those affected by the Cudlee Creek Bushfires back in December 2019.

Since the devastating effect of the fires the community has been further tested by COVID-19 resulting in loss of work for many local people and businesses.

Flint Community Care rose to the challenge of helping anyone in the local area that has been doing it tough and have been delivering food parcels and essential household items to members of the community every Friday as well as continuing to support families affected by the fires, sourcing items that they need after losing possessions.

The reason behind the new name of Flint Community Care stems from the use of flint as a fire starter. The Peramangk people, the indigenous Australians whose land we stand upon today, are known for using and trading flint as it was readily available in the landscape of the Adelaide Hills.

Within a community the fire would be a place where people came together to cook and eat and simply be with one another.

Flint Community Care brings people together and feeds people, which mirrors what flint provided for the Peramangk people and pays respect to their land that we enjoy.

If you or anyone you know is doing it tough at the moment (because what with the chaos that is 2020 many of us are), Flint Community Care are there to help.

SHED SECURITY AND WOOD THEFT

With the arrival of the cold conditions there is a potential for an increase in shed breaks and theft of chainsaws and wood. To help prevent you becoming a victim, some crime prevention measures include:

- Security lighting should be installed around sheds, garages and other storage facilities.
- Use good quality chains and padlocks to secure entrances and consider fitting additional locks (i.e. hasps, staples) to the doors and windows.
- Tools and equipment should be locked away to prevent them from being stolen or used to gain access to sheds, garages or other storage facilities.

- Mark your property with your driver's licence number, prefixed by the letter 'S' for South Australia, e.g. S123456.
- Keep a record of household and farm valuables which should include make and model, serial number, value and description. We also recommend taking images for ease of identification.

Remember, fallen trees on private property are owned by the landholder.

The Nairne and District Residents' Association (NDRA) is a group of volunteer people interested in the social, cultural and economic development of Nairne.

We work with the Mount Barker District Council, the Government, our elected representatives and other stakeholders to represent and advocate the views of the community on matters that affect our prosperity and lifestyle. We believe that collaboration and advocacy are the keys to good outcomes for all parties. We exist to hold Council, Government and other stakeholders to account on their commitment to Nairne, but we aim to do this in a culture of respect, rather than one that is adversarial and confrontational.

Our recent work saw the successful passage of the Nairne & Environs Development Plan Amendment (DPA), which defines the key blueprint for the future of the area and the Main Street redevelopment, which when complete at the end of 2021 will completely transform our town centre.

Four times a year, at the start of each season, we publish Nairne & District News, which is a significant community newsletter that includes reports, news and advertising relevant to the local community. Nairne & District News is compiled by volunteers and funded by advertising and a small cover charge. Copies are available from most Main Street businesses, selected locations in the district and by email.

We also run events such as a Family Film Night, Nairne Community Carols and Nairne History Festival. We promote heritage and culture by supporting the Nairne heritage trail, the interpretive plaques and the Nairne Museum. Our website nairne.org.au has comprehensive information about our history and access to various resources and contacts to assist and support the community.

The NDRA Facebook Page provides authoritative, factual and accurate information about what is happening in the community within the context of our objectives. Similarly, we are committed to quickly responding to questions and other enquiries so that we can empower residents and prevent the dissemination of misinformation.

The NDRA is a volunteer run organisation and our funding is derived entirely from membership fees. We meet at 7pm on the third Wednesday of each month (except December) in the Uniting Church Hall, Allargue Street, Nairne. Each meeting starts with a guest speaker, or a forum with local Councillors. We always aim to conclude our meetings around 9pm. All members of the community are welcome.



Australian Red Cross Nairne Branch

Firstly, welcome to our Winter newsletter and what a change we have seen in the last few months.

As our state and others start to recover from the bushfires, the world has been drawn to a halt by COVID-19 that has seen us alter our behavior radically to keep us as safe as we can be.

However, the Nairne Red Cross branch extends its sincere sympathy to any families who may have lost a loved one in this recent time.

During the last three months Red Cross has been on the forefront of lending assistance in the fight against COVID-19 and especially to those who are more vulnerable due to social isolation.

Examples of this work include; working with Food Bank to get food into homes, providing health hygiene packs to homeless people, starting a new phone support service for isolated people as well as providing emergency financial support to those who are in difficulty and may not qualify for other assistance.

At the international level Red Cross and Red Crescent have supported Palau, Marshall Islands, Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, Tuvalu, Papua New Guinea and other Pacific countries in their efforts to prepare communities for COVID-19.

They are also supporting efforts to contain the pandemic in Cox's Bazar in Bangladesh, where millions of people live in crowded refugee camps.

WHERE HAVE THE RED CROSS BUSH FIRE DONATIONS GONE?

We thought it would be good to share some factual information as to where those funds, so generously given, have gone so far.

A recent report issued by Red Cross covering the period from 1 Jan – 15 Apr 2020 says that \$200 million was donated, and three months into the grant recovery program \$73 million has been spent so far. \$5m enabled Red Cross to help 27,500 people with grants, \$57m has been distributed in emergency, repair, injury & bereavement grants, and \$ 11 million distributed in rebuild grants to date.

There is still \$22 million in grants for those who have not yet applied, \$59 million to rebuild homes, \$18 million to support long-term community recovery and \$28 million to support as yet unmet needs.

We know from previous experience that the ongoing needs of bush fire affected communities' surface well after the immediate needs are identified. Emotional and psychological trauma can arise weeks or months after the event and Red Cross has always made a commitment to staying in some affected areas for up to three years with support staff and facilities.

Examples of this include the Red Cross Lobethal Recovery Centre which is still open, counselling staff, support in schools to help children cope, and on-the-ground staff to help people re-build their sense of community.

The fires that ravaged many parts of South Australia, also had a devastating effect on many other communities across Australia.

One such story is told by Toni who with her husband Bruce lost their house in the Batemans Bay fire and is now in Nairne being supported by family and has received practical, emotional and financial support from Red Cross.

"On Tuesday 31st December 2019, standing on Malua Bay Beach in the company of 100s of mums, dads, children and grandparents, their family pets, cats, dogs, horses was an unreal experience in dense smoke. Everyone had evacuated as from daylight and here we were all together, with nowhere else to go, except the sea in intense smoke. Quiet, very quiet, everyone taking shelter on the beach, animals quiet too, while the fire kept on coming to the grassed areas, RFS volunteers protecting us where they were able. Within the next hour the wind changed from the hot westerly to a cold SE"

Toni went on to tell us that the roads were barricaded so everyone had to stay put and hours, later RFS volunteers told them they could shelter in the unfinished motel building across the road, where at least they would be out of the wind. Around midday Bruce said the fire was on The Ridge Road and they knew then their house was gone.

"There was no power to the area as from 7.45am, so no shops, food or drinks available all day and we sheltered in a surf lifesaving club building where a nurse brought her own medical first aid kit and provided help to Bruce and others. Just on dark the road was opened to Batemans Bay, still burning trees and embers alongside as we drove slowly 10 mins to town to see if we could get something to eat and somewhere to sleep. Everyone in the area was impacted. There was no phones after the fires, and limited text depending on location and Telstra, this continued for weeks"

Two weeks after Toni and Bruce lost their home they visited a Red Cross Recovery Centre and found the immediate help they needed.

"We visited the Recovery Centre at the RSL Club in Batemans Bay. Thankfully, when we walked in the Club a Red Cross volunteer met us at door with a warm and friendly greeting with more helpful and organised volunteers upstairs, talked to us and organised with us who we needed to talk to. Their warmth and friendly attitude made this horrible task much easier. Tea and coffee and lollies help too! Thank you to the many Red Cross volunteers who served week after week, helping hundreds of people every day to negotiate their particular situation. I found it extremely stressful and difficult to deal with"

After visiting the Recovery Centre Toni went on to say she has been contacted by designated Red Cross people to tell them they qualified for Emergency Assistance and they received the first of two \$10,000 payments from the Bush Fire Emergency Funds. These payments made to Toni and Bruce, and thousands of other families have been a result of the generosity of the Australian community in the Bush Fire Appeals.

These funds helped pay for accommodation, food and shelter, medical supplies, transport, communications, clothing and other immediate necessities.



"During January the smoke continued, and we evacuated on 2 occasions. Life was very difficult with shortages of food, petrol, gas bottles, power, phone and internet communication also not able to be easily accessed. Roads to Canberra and Sydney opened and closed due to fires. On 2 February I awoke at 4am to the smell of smoke, so we packed up our 3 overnight cases and esky and left for SA to stay with our son in Adelaide. Sam from Red Cross rang me a few days later asking after our welfare and to tell me Red Cross would continue to offer mental health counselling if we choose"

While living in Nairne Toni also visited the Red Cross Lobethal Recovery Centre, and would like to thank them for their continued support.

"We thank all South Australians for their generous support of bushfire victims through donating to the Australian Red Cross. Their 'Humanity' in times of crisis is critical and supports good mental health outcomes"

This story has been repeated many times here in South Australia with our own bush fires and if you have been affected by the fires or know someone who has, Red Cross help is available.

BUSH FIRE CASH GRANTS ARE STILL AVAILABLE!

Some cash grants are still available and these cover emergency grants for people who have lost their homes, injury grants for people who were hospitalised due to the fires, primary residence repair grants for home owners whose homes have been structurally damaged and re-establishment grants to help people who lost their primary place of residence which can include, house, caravan or mobile home, whether owned or rented in order to have somewhere safe to live.
