PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome to the first Nairne News for 2018.

Throughout 2017 there was much news and talk about various developments and changes in Nairne. For a range of reasons, the start of several of these projects was delayed, but they are definitely proceeding this year.

The Main Street project was delayed because of a backlog in the Council works programme caused by the storms we experienced during winter. Most of Council engineering resources have been focused on the repair and remediation of structures, roads and spaces that were damaged in the storms. This is not unique to our Council and has been a similar issue to all the Councils that cover the area from the Adelaide foothills east. We are told the work on our Main Street will be starting during the first quarter of 2018, as will the planning for subsequent stages. We just need to be patient and not listen to rumours that the work isn't happening.

The same applies to the Old Chapmans site. The redevelopment of a derelict factory of that state and size is long and complex, so even though you may not yet be seeing physical changes, there is preparatory work happening. We acknowledge that the developer originally indicated several dates for completion that are now unachievable, but this does not suggest it isn't happening. If you go to the website of Klose's Supermarkets, you will see they have their Nairne supermarket as a location, stating opening in 2019. If the key tenant has confidence, then so should their future customers. We should also be patient about this development and not listen to the negative rumours.

The redevelopment of the Millers Arms site is underway and is planned to be completed for December this year. Elsewhere in the Main Street, 2017 saw the establishment of several new businesses and with the recent sale and renovation of several empty buildings, we are likely to see more new retail and general businesses opening. The NDRA believes that the establishment of the shopping centre at the Old Chapmans site will signal a further redevelopment of the businesses in the Main Street, as it transforms from being focused on convenience retail

to what we believe will be an array of speciality shops, services and cafes that invite browsing and tourism. We understand the Main Street traders are being assisted by the Mount Barker District Council to establish a formal traders group, similar to what exists in Mount Barker and Hahndorf, to promote and enhance our Main Street experience. The NDRA welcomes this initiative. An active Nairne traders' group can bring significant benefit to the town.

Coinciding with the redevelopment of our Main Street, Council has given the NDRA a generous grant to create a fun ongoing activation to bring colour and vibrancy that engages visitors, promotes businesses and stimulates repeat trade. We are hoping to start this work as soon as we can, so watch for how you can get involved.

Tourism is a key focus for Nairne and in 2018 the Tourism Group established by the NDRA will broaden its work with tourism businesses and stakeholders. With the developments happening in and around Nairne, plus our historical relevance and heritage buildings, Nairne is on the brink of becoming a significant visitor destination for day visitors from Adelaide and eventually people wishing to use Nairne as a base for a stay in the Adelaide Hills. If making tourism grow is your interest, then please contact the NDRA to get involved with our Tourism Group.

Our parks and public areas will be getting a lot of attention in 2018. Byethorne Park will see the benefit of two new projects, with funding from the state government via the "Fund my Neighbourhood" scheme. There will be a new adventure playground near the lake, plus the extension of the park, with new facilities, on what is now the empty area of land along Woodside Road, immediately to the north of the car park.

Additionally in 2018, the NDRA will be working with Council to secure major project funding to create a "village green" precinct in the area bordered by the Main Street, Jeffrey Street and Allargue Street. This will involve community consultation, so start thinking about what can be done there. And finally Mount Barker Community Service is working with Council to establish a community garden, similar to the one just established in Littlehampton, on a yet to be determined area of Council land within the town.

To the west of Woodside Road, adjacent to the railway line, the "mixed use" zone will begin taking shape in 2018. This zone was defined in the Nairne & Environs Development Plan Amendment (the DPA) as an area of small scale business and enterprise that will complement (and not compete) with the main street.

Adjacent to this is a new residential development, which although approved 10 years ago, is now proceeding. The NDRA shares the concern of the community about the nature of a development proposal currently being considered and will be working closely with Council to ensure that whatever style of housing is there enhances and stimulates our community.

The NDRA believes that good residential and commercial development is essential for Nairne to prosper. Development is an inevitable aspect of the Adelaide Hills and we cannot stop it, but what we must do is work positively and intelligently with stakeholders to affect development outcomes that are right for the future.

Further along Woodside Road, on Chambers Road, a new premium beverage plant and visitor complex is being built. This complex will bring together four companies, each making cider, fruit juice, gin and beer; creating jobs and attracting visitors to the town. This is just one of several businesses which have confidence in Nairne as a great place to establish or relocate.

In 2018, the NDRA will continue to offer a forum for residents and an opportunity for them to get behind the social, cultural and economic development of Nairne. The NDRA is entirely comprised of volunteers and independent of Council. Apart from event grants, we are self-funded by a small membership fee, the sale of memorabilia and Nairne News purchases and advertising.

The NDRA will continue to meet on the third Wednesday of each month, with topical guest speakers alternating with a forum with the North Ward Councillors. We will continue to publish Nairne News at the start of each season and in between provide accurate information and updates via the NDRA Facebook Page. We will be running our popular Family Film Night in July and Carols by the Lake in December. We will also be getting behind events such as History Week, which will give us the opportunity to highlight the magnificent heritage of the town. All of this happens because of the volunteers who give up time to make a difference to our community.

Make 2018 the year that YOU decide to get involved.

We are only limited in what we can do by the number of people who are willing to get involved and do things. It is very easy for people to talk about what needs to be done in Nairne and to also criticise others for the things that are not done to their liking, but their talk will never change a thing. If only some of that talk were turned into action, our community would be booming with activity, development and excitement.

The NDRA has arranged for each of the candidates for Kavel in the forthcoming state election to attend a forum in Nairne on Tuesday March 13th where they can introduce themselves, explain their policies and answer your questions. This is a unique opportunity for the community that had one of the candidates say to us; "I wish more residents' groups were as proactive as the NDRA in organising events like this."

All five of the candidates formally nominated at the time that Nairne News went to print have accepted our invitation. We will monitor further nominations up until the close and will publish the full list of attendees on the NDRA Facebook Page.

Each of the candidates have been asked to give a brief presentation that will tell us why they are qualified to represent us, their key platforms and in particular how they can assist our community. At the end of their presentation they will be answering questions, after which they will stay for a cuppa and conversation. This is not a candidates debate, but an opportunity to give and receive information.

If you have a question for one, or all, of the candidates, it will be helpful to our agenda to have it in advance. Please send your questions to ndra@live.com.au, identifying the candidate whom you'd like to answer. There will be some time for general questions from the floor, but because the time will be limited, we are preferring to have questions in advance. Questions submitted will be published (anonymously) on the NDRA Facebook Page. If there is no time for all pre-submitted questions to be addressed, we will attempt to publish answers on the NDRA Facebook Page. Additional questions can be asked directly of the candidates over the cuppa afterwards.

The forum is at the Nairne Sportsground Clubrooms starting at 7pm sharp and will conclude by 8.30pm, after which the candidates will be available over a cuppa until 9pm.

Councillor's Commentary

Connecting Byethorne to Nairne Main Street

After two years of discussions with Council officers regarding linking Byethorne Park to Nairne Main Street, I'm pleased that the provision for this path was added to the Council's draft trail plans in the 4 year capital works program.

However due to the success of the Fund My Neighbourhood grants for upgrades to Byethorne Park and the Main Street Upgrade and activation, staff agree with me that this needs to be prioritised. There are design and approvals which need to be investigated and completed over the next 12 months and it is likely to be in the 2019/20 capital works budget. I will be monitoring the progress. I would like to thank Katrina Windebank and Lynette Sharp for taking the initiative to apply for the Fund My Neighbourhood Grants.

Cat Management Group

I am pleased to have been appointed one of the Councillors, along side of Cr Harry Seager, to the Cat Management Group at February's Council Meeting. The Cat Management Working Group will be a forum to discuss current cat management issues, potential strategies and interventions including what other Councils are doing in regard to cat management and whether the creation of a cat By-law is a desired option for our Council.

There will be an Expression of Interest process to fill three community member positions. If you are interested in joining this group please go to the Council's website for the application form.



Nixon Street Footbridge Repair

As mentioned in my November Nairne News report, the Nixon Street Ford rebuild was included in the 2017/18 budget. Council is reinstating the ford crossing due to damage that has occurred to the existing structure. As part of the construction, footpath approaches to the crossing will be installed along with the road blockades being replaced with an aesthetically improved fencing. Upon completion, the ford will be reopened for public pedestrian use. Council anticipates the crossing will be re-opened in March.

This matter was brought to the attention of both Cr Seager and myself by several residents last July and we are pleased Council was able to accommodate this in the budget.

Community Garden

Last year you may remember a call for an expression of interest from residents who were interested in being involved in a community garden in Nairne. The location suggested was the old Netball Courts on Jeffrey Street, however due to the Nairne Museum's plan to put in a Fund My Neighbourhood Grant application for a Nairne Village Green in the second round, we are considering an alternate location on Council land. We do have a space in mind that we are investigating, but first the groundwork and discussions with surrounding stakeholders is required.

2018 Nairne Australian of the Year

The 2018 Nairne Australian of the Year, Malcolm Leonard May, is a man many of the community may not have heard of. He has lived in Nairne all of his life. He is out there helping the community to stay safe and asks for no recognition. He started his working life at Chapman's at fourteen years of age, and worked there for approximately forty years. Some of his duties were stock buyer and helping on the Chapman's farm. In his early years he played a little local football. He has been described to me as quiet, reserved, and a real family man.

He first joined the EFS on the 1st December 1959 (on his 16th birthday) as a cadet firefighter.

Malcolm is heavily involved with training and incidents but also very much involved with station maintenance and additions, along with building and maintaining appliances.

He helped in the early years to build new fire trucks. They would source a truck and do a repurpose build for the CFS in the early days known as EFS.

Malcolm was the main local CFS truck driver for many years. He undertook a range of training courses, including very early breathing air training with the South Australian Metropolitan Fire Service. He earned a well-respected reputation as a driver and seasoned firefighter, and was a great mentor to many members over the years.



Although no longer operationally involved with the brigade, his current total time with the service is 58 years.

Lyall Strout, born and bred in Nairne and educated at Nairne Primary and Mount Barker High Schools, commenced work at Chapmans' as the office boy. He worked his way through departments, eventually becoming manager of 250 employees and spending 36 years with Chapmans'.

Lyall joined the Nairne CFS in 1960 and retired in 1996, after serving 15 years as Lieutenant and 13 as Captain. He was awarded the National Medal & Clasp in 1986 and Life Membership of Nairne CFS in 1996.

Lyall played twelve years in Nairne Football Club, achieving three Best & Fairest Awards. He played in several grand finals. He also coached Nairne's first mini colts teams for three years, and SturtW's mini league side and was Club President.

Lyall, father of three sons and grandfather of eight, recently celebrated 50 years of marriage to Carol.

ST. JAMES BLAKISTON NEWSLETTER

I was sitting in the church pondering the subject for this article when I saw the plaque erected to the memory of Captain Francis Davison who died in 1861 and was one of the founding fathers of this church.

Francis Davison was born at County York, England and entered the British Navy, and at age 12 was awarded a prize for the capture of the French ship "Suzanne". Thus his career on the sea began. He was indentured to his uncle for seven years in 1814 and later commanded his uncle's ships. While he was captain of the ship 'Ceylon' he visited Australia in 1833.

In June 1835 he married Elizabeth Hawden. Her brother's had settled in Australia and they encouraged the young couple to follow their example. They arrived at Port Adelaide on Christmas Eve, 1839.

Mrs Davison did not like the heat, sandy soil and high cost of rent and provisions in Adelaide and so Francis selected land in the Mt. Barker district, naming the property Blakiston after his home area in England.

Francis was the principal man in the Mount Barker district in the early days. He was a farmer, pastoralist,

stipendary magistrate, Police Commissioner, among other things. The possessions he brought to Australia included a dog, a calf, a cat and a cow. It took three drays and 22 bullocks to convey the belongings to Mt. Barker and seven weeks to complete the shift. Road conditions were stated as 'frightful'.

Three years after his arrival in the colony a huge limb from a gum fell and pinned him beneath it. He was seriously injured and never fully recovered from the accident.

He was instrumental in the planning of the St. James church and prior to the building of this church services were held in his home. He wrote letters to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel urging them to provide an incumbent priest for the area. Elizabeth Davison laid the foundation stone on the 3rd October 1846 as listed in his diary but we have been unable to find this stone.

At the same time there was planning and building of the Rectory for a home for the priest and his family, this was opened in 1846 and services were held in the Rectory until the opening of the church on April 1847.

Francis Davison died on 23 October 1861 and is buried in the St. James cemetery. However his legacy to the people continues and services are held on the 2nd and 4th Sundays at 8.30am, and a welcoming fellowship group meets on the 1st Thursday each month.

HOW HAS GOD LOVED US?

Excerpts from the Discovery Series

All through the centuries there have been confusion and conflicting opinions about the love of God and whether He cares about us. How can we take comfort in the love of God if we don't feel loved? What if circumstances seem to say that God is ignoring us, that He has abandoned us to our pain, and that He is deliberately withholding from us what He could so easily grant?

Some of the most religious people in the world have wondered how they could believe in a God who said He loved them while acting as though He didn't. In about 450 BC, Malachi, a writer of one of the Old Testament books said to the people of Jerusalem, "'I have loved you,' says the Lord. But you ask, 'How have I loved you?'" (Malachi 1:2).

The Bible makes it clear that God loves us because of who He is rather than because of who we are. He offers to be our God not because we are lovable but because He is loving. His care for us isn't dependent on us always doing the right thing or having good intentions. He loves

us because that is the kind of God He is. The Bible explains that the demonstration of that amazing love is in Jesus Christ, His life and death and resurrection. He was crucified for our sin, for all the things we are and do that distance us from God and cause us to feel abandoned and unloved. His resurrection shows that He has the power over death and sin and that now neither can separate us from God. In fact, "nothing will be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8: 39). In Christ we are able to enter fully into the love and acceptance of God, as a free gift, not as a reward for what we have or haven't done. We are no longer dependent on circumstances, other people or our own perceptions to know that God loves us. We begin to see the evidence of His love in unexpected places and come to understand that He works everything together for our good, no matter how hard or painful, because He loves us.

How has God loved us? "In this is love, no that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins." (1 John 4:10)

This is the message of Easter.

Lot 101: Nairne's New Cellar Door

Nairne is about to have a pin placed firmly on its map, becoming a 'must visit' destination for international tourists seeking award winning beverages.

A media hush has been held on the details, with very little known up until now. Ruth Morris of the Nairne News caught up with Toby Kline recently over one of their already popular beverages.

It started with a 27 hectare orchard in Chambers Road that the owner thought was of no interest to anyone. But it sounded perfect to Toby, who was intrigued by the growth prospects that the area was about to undergo. Its proximity to Hahndorf also made it desirable, along with it being close to Adelaide and Mount Barker. A balance of agriculture and nature existed, providing the perfect basis for his vision. It was the perfect fit, the piece in the jigsaw he had been looking for.

The new cellar door, named 'Lot 101', will be home to ***The Hills Cider Company, Mismatch Brewery*** and ***Adelaide Hills Distillery***, who have an international reputation through winning a host of recent awards.

"ciders, gin and beer"

Not doing things by half measures, the project consists of a 600m² cellar door. The brewery and distillery have a rapidly expanding production capacity to produce a high volume of beverages. Everything is done on site, from growing the fruit, crushing the fruit, growing the hops, brewing the beer and distilling the gin.

Local produce is used, not Chinese concentrate. Old heritage apples are both grown and sourced locally. The fruit that the supermarkets won't stock is perfect for beverages. South Australian produce is very important to the group.

The production of ciders, gin and beer normally results in seven litres of water being wasted per litre of beverage produced, but this plant has zero waste, a record that has never before been achieved. Reverse osmosis from three bores and a 300kw solar energy system on site means the complex has the capacity to operate off-grid.

Founding breweries and distilleries is something most people would not attempt. Toby already consults to over forty pubs throughout Australia, so he is no stranger to the hospitality industry, and is confident the project will be an outstanding success.

Listening to feedback is vital for Toby's team. He realises, by listening to people, that the supply chain needs to be investigated all the way through to the grower and harvester to ensure fair trade. Toby is open to people approaching him with their views.

It is tipped that SA Tourism and Tourism Australia will be promoting this area substantially in the future. An international audience is enabling the beverages to gain the highest accolades in the world. Thus, media around the world have been hounding the team for details, but the secret is yet to be told.

Toby thinks that the story here is better than Tasmania's, but he's not as good at telling stories as producing award winning beverages!

The project has a tourism focus, providing around 35-40 jobs when operational. The cellar door will be 60 metres long and has quite an impact, without interfering with existing trees. Boasting a cantilever deck, a 10 metre bar with 40 taps, and a courtyard, it also aims to appeal to families with juices and a playground.

The property is also ideal for weddings, with the capacity to seat 273 guests.

An exhibition space is planned with a sculpture garden, so the place has the potential to become an arts Mecca. Connections with The Fringe, Adelaide Festival and Womad already exist.

The cellar door is anticipated to open in July depending on variables synonymous with creating buildings. The cultural, social, economic benefits of the new venture for Nairne are exciting.

Skin Allergies

Skin allergies are one of the most common reasons pets need to see a vet. There are many types of allergic reactions and they're known as hypersensitivities. The human condition 'hay fever', is a hypersensitivity to pollens causing itching, redness and sneezing.

The most common skin allergy we see in our dogs and cats is flea allergy dermatitis. Fleas are parasitic insects that feed on the blood of their hosts. These hosts include not just dogs and cats but also ferrets, rabbits, mice, birds and even humans. The saliva from the flea causes a reaction that can cause intense itchiness. Pets will often suddenly turn to chew themselves and lesions are found most commonly around the tail base and hind legs. A single bite in a flea allergic pet can be enough to cause a severe reaction while some pets won't react to hundreds of bites. Religious control of the parasite is required to manage this condition. Treatment of all in contact animals with a high quality oral or topical medication, washing bedding and vacuuming surfaces will help to control and eventually eliminate the infestation. Beware though – social dogs or outdoor cats may regularly be picking up new fleas to start the cycle again.



Atopic dermatitis is a hypersensitivity to environmental allergens. Some common causes include dust mites, grasses or pollens but often pets have multiple 'triggers'. It is often easier to think of the pet as having sensitive skin – the condition is very complex and things like scratching, temperature and humidity all play their part. Mildly affected dogs may just scratch a little more in the spring/summer but severely affected dogs are itchy all year and, left untreated, have marked reduction in quality of life. Staffies and West Highland White Terriers are more commonly affected.

Don't forget to chip & snip!

Because atopic pets may be allergic to any number of environmental allergens, there is no single simple test and is often diagnosed after other conditions are ruled out. Unfortunately some of these conditions occur simultaneously, further complicating the pet's issue and frustrating owners. Managing atopy involves multiple avenues but drugs to control the over-reacting immune system and antibiotics are the "big guns".

Food allergies which affect the skin are infrequent but can occur. The proteins in food are typically the cause and a diet trial is required to diagnose. This involves feeding a new protein and carbohydrate source – for a minimum of 6 weeks. Any snack outside of this can potentially nullify the trial and require owners to restart the process. They often occur from a young age and tend to lack the seasonality of other allergies.

Overall allergies are a chronic and frustrating condition that requires ongoing management. If your pet suffers from one of these debilitating conditions please contact the clinic so we can help organise a long-term treatment plan tailored to you and your pet.

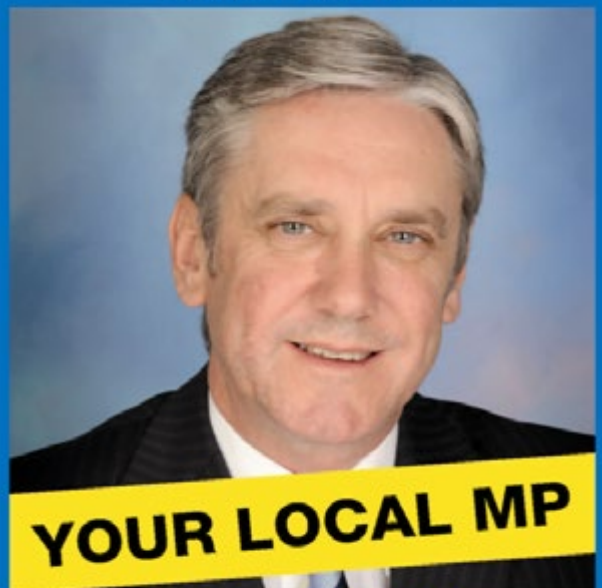

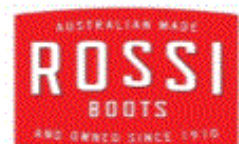

Vehicle Security

Unfortunately lately there have been a number of thefts from motor vehicles in the Hills Fleurieu Local Service Area, and of concern to police is that a number of the cars had been left unlocked. Various items including iPhones, wallets and cash were stolen.

Officer in charge of the Hills-Fleurieu Local Service Area, Superintendent Mark Fairney, offers the following advice to avoid becoming a victim of this type of crime. "If you don't lock it you are going to lose it, don't leave your vehicle unlocked in the hope that a thief will not damage the car to get in. Removing or hiding valuables makes your car much less of a target, the two seconds of effort required to lock your car or remove valuable items is nothing compared to the time taken in replacing property, reporting the theft to the Police and dealing with your insurance company."

By following these simple security tips you can minimise theft from your vehicle:

- Ensure all valuables are removed from your vehicle or conceal them in the boot of the vehicle before arriving at your destination.
- Lock your vehicle doors and close windows.
- Install an audible alarm.
- At night park your vehicle in a well-lit area.
- Engrave your valuables with your driver's licence number prefixed with an 'S' for South Australia.
- Park your vehicle in a garage at night where possible.
- Avoid hiding a second set of keys in the vehicle – if the vehicle is broken into they may find the keys and take the car as well as your valuables.
- Avoid placing bags and wallets on the passenger seat where they could be easily stolen.

Arson Prevention

Arson is the act of intending, or being reckless, with fire to destroy or damage property.

Arson can occur against different types of property including vehicles, homes, buildings, and other tangible property. Arson can also occur in grassed and bush areas.

South Australia Police is committed to preventing deliberate, reckless or negligent lit fires in your local area.

By considering some simple prevention tips you can minimise the risk of arson in your community.

- Keep your home, sheds and vehicles locked at all times.
- Consider the storage location of any fuel and flammable liquids – if possible store in a locked cabinet located away from the house.
- Keep your yard and premises clear of combustibles such as rubbish and plant material.
- Keep lawns and grasslands surrounding homes and sheds maintained. If necessary contact your local council to manage surrounding areas.
- Plant shrubs and bushes away from houses and sheds.
- Be on the lookout for other forms of vandalism. If graffiti or damage is not cleared up quickly, it can make the area a target for arson.
- Ensure periodic inspections of your own property and conduct fire risk assessments.
- Install fire extinguishers, fire blankets, smoke alarms and any other fire protective equipment necessary, ensuring these systems are checked regularly.
- Gaps under doors should be narrow to prevent paper or fuel being pushed under them.

- Characteristics such as their age, gender, weight, height, hair colour or clothing.

If you see a fire, immediately call Triple Zero (000).
If you see anything suspicious immediately call the Police Assistance line on 131 444.

If you have any information about who is deliberately lighting fires or engaging in reckless or negligent fire lighting behaviour contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or online at www.sa.crimestoppers.com.au. You can remain anonymous.

The NDRA will be preparing a proposal for funding to develop the centre of Nairne into a 'Village Green' to provide incentives for residents and visitors to make use of the areas around Jeffrey Street.

This could include:

- BBQ and picnic areas (adjacent to the tennis courts)
- Small, informal market stall area plus room for a busker, possibly adjacent to the sculpture
- Approx. 20 or so extra off road parking spaces
- Development of the Netball court into play space for children

We would be happy to hear of any other suggestions from Nairne residents. Funding will be applied for from the State Government's 'Fund my Neighbourhood' allocations for 2018/2019. Projects can be up to \$150,000.

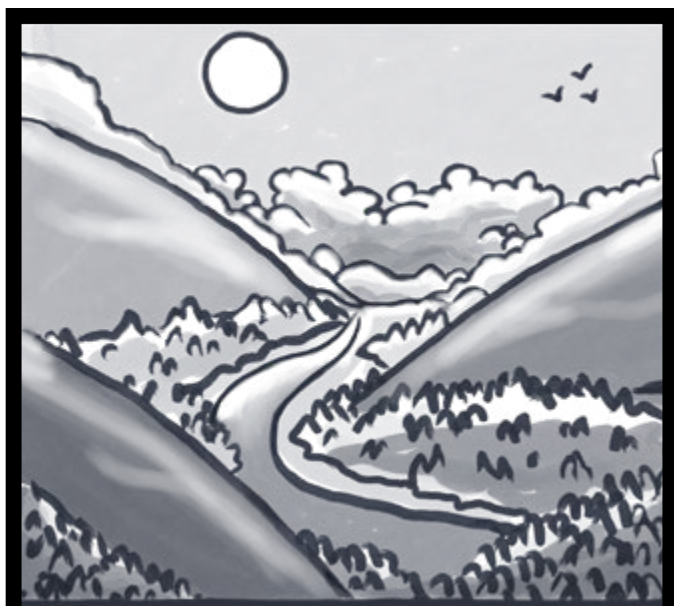

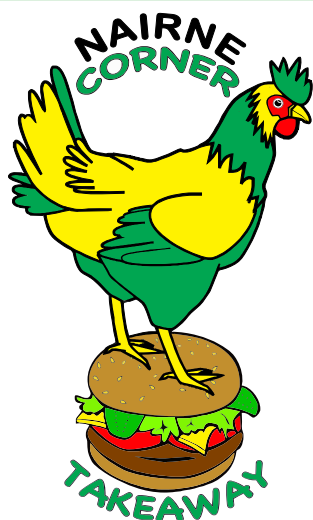
