Town revitalisation continues.



The reopening of the Nairne Service Station has been a very welcome event this last month (see page 3). Following close behind the opening of Flo Jo's diner in the Main Street, and the new ownership of the pharmacy with a strong community focus, the service station provides more impetus for people to come into the Main Street to do their shopping. In addition, a new doctor, Dr Lasath Hattotuwa, will soon be serving the community from within the previously vacated Nairne Medical Clinic premises (see page 3).

All of this brings hope to other traders on the Main Street, who have been hanging on despite difficult times. A shadow hangs over the Main Street in the form of a possible competing shopping area which may be developed to the west of Nairne (see Nairne Master Plan Special insert, centre page). The draft Nairne Master Plan does not clarify the situation with all options still on the table, but it is hoped that the final version will provide certainty for the traders as they look to the future.

There is a momentum building in Nairne and it is visible in lots of places. Businesses are reopening, the Mt Barker Council is calling for our submissions on what we want for our town, attempts are being made to improve the traffic outside the post office and much more...

Nairne Master Plan. Put in your submissions by 5 pm, 13 September. Even a few lines on one issue helps send a message to Council. The more responses they receive, the more they will take us, the voters, seriously. They need our local knowledge. I know it feels like we are always battling for our town, but we do get results for all our work even though it often feels like we don't. Turn to the centre page for more details.

Jeffrey St footpath. There is a new footpath leading from Main St up to Britannia Rd and it has improved the safe travels of at least one senior citizen in a gopher. Fortunately it is now wide enough, as when it was laid initially it was much narrower due to a big rock cutting into the path. Many thanks to Cr. Trevor Corbell for taking up this matter with the Council's staff who had the rock removed and the footpath re-laid to its full width.

Main St at Nairne Post Office. The vice president of NDRA has written to the State Government asking for the large yellow rumble humps to be reinstalled to their original position outside the Post Office. Working with Craig Sadler we learnt that they were removed some years ago when the Tour Down Under came through Nairne. Although they were reinstated in many other locations, the Main Street missed out. Hopefully this will be a simple matter as it is not asking for anything new.

Monthly information sessions. Each month (3rd Wednesday 7 pm, The Institute) the NDRA holds an information session before its general meeting. We alternate between a Councillor forum and talks by local residents, or by people with useful information for residents. The September session will be with Councillors who will report on Nairne related matters and take questions. If you have an issue you want addressed, come along.

Nairne Medical Clinic reopens

The Nairne Medical Clinic will reopen its doors in early September with Dr Lasath Hattotuwa starting up his own general practice. Lasath has lived in South Australia since he was 15 years old, when he migrated from Sri Lanka with his parents. He attended Norwood High School, and completed his MBBS at the University of Adelaide in 1997. Since then, he has had a variety of work experience both in general practice and in the hospital environment, with the majority of that time spent with Disability SA as a senior medical officer looking after intellectually disabled people.

Lasath will run the practice as a bulk-billing clinic, **meaning no gap fees for patients**. His aim is to provide quality medical services and to make it available for all, irrespective of people's financial position. For him, it is all about helping people.

Signs on the clinic windows, and a voice message on the clinic phone (8388 6288) will advise the date of commencement of the practice.

The Nairne Service Station

For Helen and Bob Worland, the Nairne Service Station is the perfect opportunity to create a business near home so that Bob, who currently spends time away in the mining industry, can work near home and family. Their reopening of the service station has been a welcome event for Nairne, as Helen remarked, "Everyone is so happy to see us!" And they have been overwhelmed by how welcoming and friendly other local businesses have been.

Helen and Bob have a strong focus on "local". In refitting the shop they employed all local tradespeople, and were really pleased with the quality of the work done. Now they employ three local people in the shop part-time, and also a full-time mechanic, Bruce Field. Bruce specialises in classic cars and rally cars, and can do custom fabrications such as roll bars, as well as a general service.

In addition to petrol, the shop has fair-trade coffee, local cupcakes from Cupcake Crumbz, newspapers, hot snacks (pies, pasties and toasted sandwiches) and soup. The soup is always home-made, using local, free-range, organic produce. Helen is aware that many people have dietary restrictions, and as the food side of the business develops, she would like to be able to cater to people with these needs. New to shopkeeping, Helen is grappling with some of the processes, including what to do with all the scraps and unsold, out-of-date produce. Anyone with pigs, or other ideas to help out, come and talk to Helen. She would love to find a local solution!

The Service Station is open from 6.30 am to 7 pm on weekdays, and 8 am to 6 pm on weekends.

Councillor's commentary....

A perhaps scary thought . . . the year is passing very quickly and, by about the time you probably read this, there will only be 16 weeks 'til Christmas! As I said, scary, but at least the warmer weather will also be coming back. However, getting back to business, following are some comments on a few of the things currently coming across my desk.


Nairne Township Master Plan (NMP). On 9 July a draft of the NMP was approved for release by Council for community consultation. The draft was then made more publically available, with a formal consultation period open from 30 July to 13 September. The many community organisations involved in initial discussions which took place in early 2012 have been formally invited to put forward their comments on the draft NMP, and advertisements appeared in the press encouraging other members of the community to also put their views. A public community forum was held on 14 August, at which Council's planning consultant Bill Chandler provided background to the draft NMP he has prepared.

The draft NMP addresses a very wide range of issues with which Nairne is already confronting, and which will need to be focussed on in the near and later future. These fall into five main themes: the Town Setting (historical elements, environmental issues, town boundaries, etc); mix and character of the Residential element; Movement & Connectivity (roads, public transport, future pedestrian/cycle ways, etc); Business & Economics (Main Street revitalisation options, commercial redevelopment opportunities at western and eastern ends of town, etc); and Facilities & Services (current and future community and sporting facilities needs, etc).

More details can be found on Council's website (dcmtbarker.sa.gov.au) or you can pick up a hard copy of the draft NMP and submission form at Council's office. Please take the time to make sure your views are heard by lodging a submission before **13 September**.

Vandalism. Sadly, Nairne has been targeted by recent acts of senseless vandalism. An incident over the 28-29 July weekend resulted in around \$10,000 damage being done at Byethorne Park, including the destruction of around thirty small trees. That incident has been identified as a crime scene by SAPOL and investigations are continuing. But sometimes out of adversity we see community spirit rise up. While the details have yet to be worked out, several community groups have already offered money and labour to assist Council staff make good the damage done.

However, since the Byethorne Park incident, vandals removed a rubbish bin from the skate-park on Jeffrey St, placing it on the nearby rail-

way line where it was hit by a train. We are all trying very hard to keep Nairne a good place for our families to live, but it is stupid acts like these which cause much frustration and disappointment to know that we have such less-caring people living amongst us. If you see or are aware of such incidents occurring please let the good people at the Mt Barker Police Station know (8398 6900) or call 'Crime Stoppers' on 1800 333 000.

Nairne Retirement Village. You might recall that, back in June, Council gave approval for a caveat to be lifted from the land occupied by the Nairne Retirement Village. That was done in the light of a planned sale of the facility by Elderly Care Homes (ECH) to KeyInvest. The caveat originally served to ensure that the land upon which the village is located could not be used for any other purpose. However, with the advent of the *Retirement Villages Act* in 1986, the Council-imposed caveat became unnecessary. I know that the current residents of the village were very pleased to contemplate the planned sale. However, the residents (and Council) have since been advised that negotiations between ECH and KeyInvest have been broken off. No further explanation has been forthcoming, but ECH have advised that over the next 2-3 months they are looking to see which other bodies might be interested in taking on the village. While the residents have been disappointed by the current situation, they can be assured that the removal of the caveat will not have any effect on their continuing occupancy of units at the village.

Train noise. Nairne is the only town in the Mt Barker District directly affected by an active rail line. With longer and more frequent freight trains being foreshadowed by the Australian Rail Track Corporation (ARTC) to use the main Adelaide-Melbourne line through Nairne, aside from other potential hazards created by that situation, the already obvious nuisance caused by train 'wheel squeal' noise is likely to become more apparent. On 6 August, I put a question to Council asking for contact to be made with ARTC to establish whether that organisation could examine the situation in Nairne as was recently reported by the media in relation to a similar problem around Stirling and Heathfield. Measures being taken there, and elsewhere, include the installation of a 'rail lubrication' system and modifications to offending wagon bogies.

ARTC have established a complaint 'hotline' called 'Enviroline', where people concerned about train 'wheel squeal' can lodge their concerns - phone 1300 550 402 or e-mail enviroline@artc.com.au. It would also assist Council to advocate for improvements if any complaints lodged with ARTC's 'Enviroline' were also made known to Council on 8391 7200 or at council@demtbarker.sa.gov.au. In the meantime, together with one of Council's staff, I am meeting with representatives of the City of Mitcham Council and the EPA who are already pursuing this issue with ARTC.

New businesses. It's good to see more small businesses putting their faith in Nairne's future. Recently opened and popular **Flo Jo's Diner** has now been joined by the **Nairne Service Station**. And at the time of writing, Dr Lasath Hattotuwa expected to be available full-time from the beginning of September for GP consultations at the **Nairne Medical Clinic**. The practice, after being closed for 9 months, again presents Nairne with another essential and welcome community service. Please support these new businesses and the others already here. They are committing themselves to our town.

NAIRNE RESIDENTS GET CREATIVE with IMAGINATE 2012

"I went along to Wendy Fantasia's face painting workshop to lend a hand" she commented. "Who would have thought it would be so technical? Draft Nairne Master Plan

The draft Nairne Master Plan (NMP) has been drawn up by consultants for the District Council of Mount Barker. Council are to be commended for undertaking this major planning activity. You may remember, around Christmas-time last year, a community engagement consultant met with local groups and individuals and gathered together relevant local information and opinions about how Nairne's future can be planned for.


You may have been involved in that consultation period, which resulted in reports to Council that were to help inform the planning process. A lot of really good feedback went into those reports, including the oft-given plea for urgent attention to the state of North Road, and requests for improvements to the basic infrastructure around the town, such as footpaths. Of Nairne's collective opinion, the summary consultation report also states:

"There was a clearly expressed preference for residential growth to be confined to within the current township boundary. There were various reasons expressed for this view, including a desire to see highly productive agricultural land surrounding the Nairne township preserved, the need for a buffer that would serve to protect the township from bushfire risk, and the clear differentiation of Nairne from other townships to give it the best chance of strengthening its role as a community centre rather than becoming purely a domiciliary suburb."

On examination of the draft Plan, however, Council are still deliberating on the possible re-zoning of land, which is currently zoned "Rural", for residential purposes (see map below). This is surprising given the consistent message that has been coming from Nairne for years on this subject. The State Government's 30 year Plan for Greater Adelaide resulted in 1300 ha of rural land being re-zoned for residential use to cater to future housing needs in the area around Mt Barker for the next 15-30 years. 45 ha of that new housing land is south of the Primary School and is still to be developed. There is, therefore, absolutely no need to re-zone more rural land for housing—especially the land west of Nairne which is renowned for its fertile soil type, which supports profitable vegetable farms and vineyards such as those along Woodside Road and Bald Hills Road.

Land zoned "Rural" which is marked "Potential new residential development" in the NMP (Map 3).

Land zoned Residential/Light Industry, west of Woodside Rd, marked "Business / Redevelopment precinct" in the NMP (Map 6).

Hello and Welcome to our **Quarterly Update** for the **Nairne & Districts marketplace**

Amid global economic gloom and a generally subdued housing market, encouraging signs have emerged in the Australian housing market.

The September Westpac Melbourne Institute Index of Consumer Sentiment is at its highest level in two years. The survey that tracks responses on 'whether now is a good time to buy a dwelling' jumped 15.1% in September, following a gain of 8.1% from August to September.

Anxious households drew comfort from concrete evidence of an improved outlook for rates when major banks lowered fixed-rate mortgage rates in August. Strong recovery in economic growth in the June quarter attracted wide coverage and this is likely to have also boosted spirits.

If the financial markets and the more bearish economists are right, and the Reserve Bank has come to the end of a cycle of tightening, Australian housing is likely to be one of the safer places to invest. While there has effectively been no house price growth for 19 months, household disposable incomes have grown rapidly at 7% to 8% per annum.

With the possibility of mortgage rates coming down to around 5.6%, the possibility of a return to healthy house

price growth re-emerges as savers are punished via lower cash returns and geared investors run for the perceived security of bricks and mortar. First Home Buyers (FHBs) are expected to reappear towards the end of this year, while one mortgage originator says loan enquiries from FHBs are up 15% nationwide on the back of interest rate stability for the past 10 months.

So, although 2011 has been a tough year for Australian property, our market has performed admirably well and this underlines its resilience as well as the long-term benefits of property investment.

Let's Get Your Pets Ready for Spring.

By Dr Catherine Motter, Littlehampton Vet Clinic.

Spring is here, the best time of year, but, for your dog and cat the flowers blooming and the insects thriving can cause your pet a lot of anguish. Unlike people, when dogs get allergies they don't show up as sneezing or runny noses, they just itch, and itch. Owners assume this means their pets have fleas, but most often it means that something in their environment is causing their immune system to overreact. If your dog's abdomen is red or they start to lose hair, go to your vet and get a correct diagnosis about what is causing the scratching. The important thing to remember is that allergies are never actually cured, they are managed.

Insect bites can be a big problem for dogs: bees, biting ants and European wasps can cause significant illness and even death if left untreated. If you notice facial swelling or hives on your pet, it is very important to get to your vet, especially if they are having trouble breathing. I also recommend to my clients that they carry the antihistamine, Chlorpheniramine, available at any chemist. The average 20 kg dog could have one 6 mg tablet orally, on the way to the vet.

Fleas are always in the environment, but this time of year they become far more active. Only a small percentage of dogs are flea allergic - when bitten they can literally scratch their skin off. Most dogs and cats just become more itchy than normal. The key message I tell my clients is that flea shampoos, powders, collars and products purchased from grocery stores don't work. They only kill adult fleas, so all the eggs and larvae are unscathed, and will continue to reproduce by the thousands, daily. There are literally hundreds of flea treatments on the market, the only one that I recommend is Revolution. This is because fleas have developed resistance to most of the other products on the market. Hoping you and your pets have a great Spring!




GIRL GUIDES AUSTRALIA



They Walk Amongst Us

He could have been the delivery driver you just signed something for. He could have been the sales representative from that big company down in town. He could have just finished landscaping your garden, suggested the best pavers for your driveway, be teaching your kids at the school, or he is surveying the super-way. He could be thin, wide, tall or short. He could be 30. He could be 50. He could have three children. He could have one. He could be any of the above.

But on Friday nights he is something else. His job is something he's left behind. He is now part of a team, part of a club. He is a member of Soccer Dads. He is there to work on his game, to lose some weight, to improve his fitness, to catch up with his mates.

On Friday nights there is a group of Adelaide Hills men who get together to play a game called futsal. Futsal is a variant on soccer that is played on a smaller pitch, usually indoors. The smaller goals require greater accuracy on shots. Futsal is a fast-paced game, forcing players to run constantly, improving their fitness. And it's not just for seasoned soccer players. Anyone can do it and everyone is encouraged to come along.
