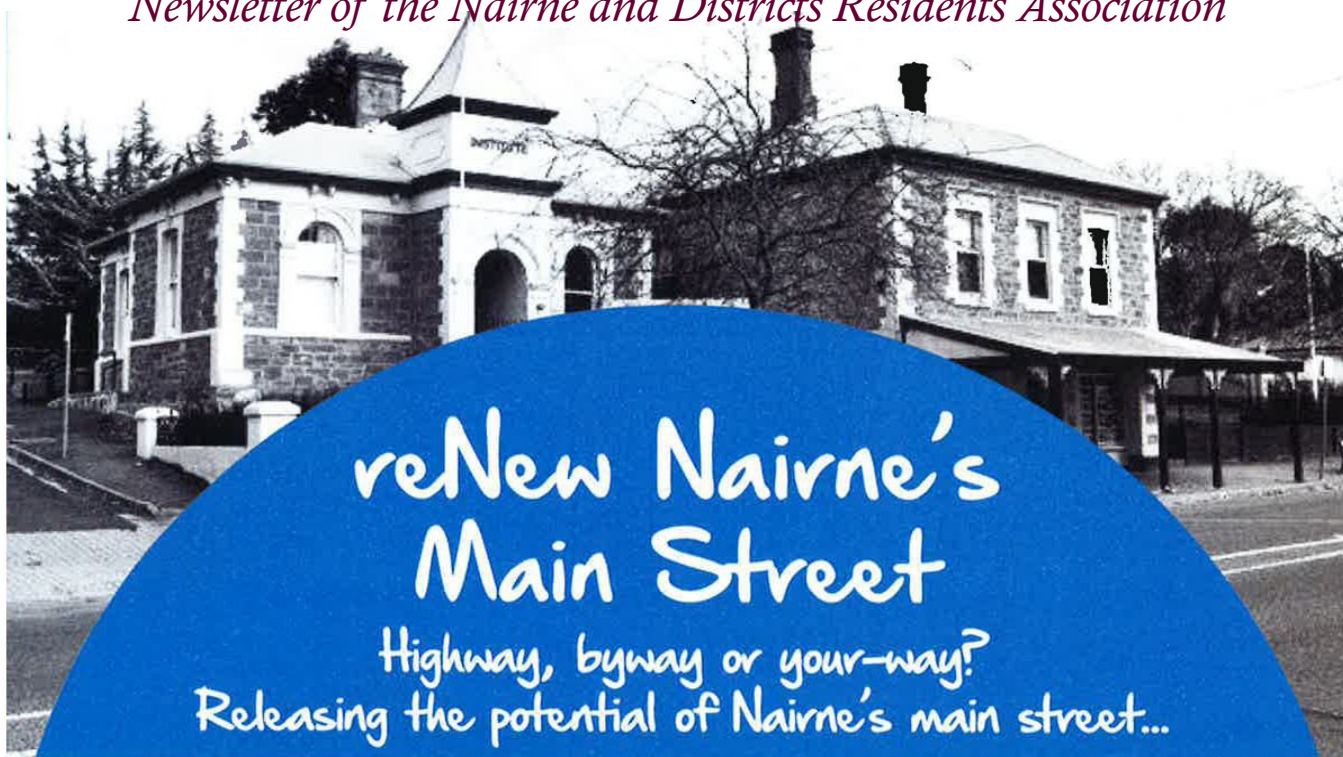

Highway, byway or your-way?
Releasing the potential of Nairne's main street...

What are we doing and why?

Mount Barker District Council wants to support ways in which Main Road, Nairne's 'main street', can flourish!

Since January this year Council has been working with local traders, landowners, community members and other stakeholders to develop a masterplan and improvement strategy. What have learned is that Main Road is not always the lively local destination it could be. Nor is it helping to attract significant numbers of visitors to the town.

Council has identified 12 Priorities for Change that it thinks will lift the profile of the street, and give people a better reason to come to the street and patronise its businesses and services.

Council is seeking feedback from businesses, landowners and the community about these ideas before the masterplan is finalised.

12 Priorities for Change

- 1 Renewed community hub at the heart of the township - Mick Murphy 'Village Green'
- 2 New outdoor dining hub and meeting place around Leith Street
- 3 Redesign Main Road as a safer and greener Main Street (initially between Nairne Soldiers Memorial Hall and Post Office)
- 4 Improve the arrival experience of the street
- 5 Celebrate the history of the street (including a Nairne Historic Trail)
- 6 Make the main street easier to get to from Nairne's residential areas
- 7 Wider footpaths with new seating areas and outdoor dining including parklets (mini-park structures placed in the street)
- 8 Add and selectively replace street trees and shrub planting (initially between Nairne Soldiers Memorial Hall and Post Office)
- 9 Street infrastructure improvements and public art
- 10 Support a small supermarket at the former Chapmans' site to draw more people through the street
- 11 Increase street activity and the town profile through a programme of small and large events
- 12 Establish and work with a Nairne Mainstreet Group to promote Main Road and assist with improvement projects

Ink pot Triumph!

I hardly feel I can write the view from here right now. The idea of this column was to reflect on the goings on in Nairne from my position living in the main street. But of late I don't feel I've been around enough to know!

The last few weeks I have been performing in one of the most recent **Ink Pot Arts** productions - Footprint to Footplate - an historical musical/comedy/drama of the local area, Mt Barker Hahndorf and Nairne. I became involved last year with Ink Pot Arts in this production which has been revived this year and sharpened up to be taken on tour. This highly theatrical and complex piece was written by Strathalbyn playwright Brian Fox under a commission from the historical railway in Mt Barker. Last year we did a fabulously successful run using the platform of that railway station as a stage, with the seating on the tracks.

I know a number of Nairne News readers would have seen the play—we had lots of lovely positive feedback from the community. Many people came not knowing quite what to expect but came away laughing and joking and humming the tunes. It's been such a wonderful feel good play with delicious musical interludes - raucous physical comedy and poignant moments to ponder, all as you come to understand some of the stories of our local area and the characters that have laid the foundations of the towns we live in. Such a complex piece to pull together, even up to the days leading to the original opening night late last year, it was hard for us in it to see we had a show. But thankfully our director, Nairne resident Jo-anne Sarre, is a woman with vision! She embodies the true spirit of the old theatre adage 'the show must go on'. Throughout getting the show off the ground last year and reviving it this year, Jo-anne has had just about every obstacle you could imagine thrown at her—including the kitchen sink!! And lived to tell the tale!

It's never easy to bring something new into the world—take childbirth— and this play is something new. It's a pretty special thing to have freshly devised and original theatre created by locals, telling stories about the world we live in. Sometimes it seems there are invisible forces that conspire to shut down anything wonderful and original that us humans attempt. So all power to Jo-anne for her tenacity and pioneering spirit, and to those who give above and beyond by supporting her.

If you missed out on seeing the play, don't despair! Just wait till it comes out on DVD! One of the talented members of the Ink Pot crew—multi media artist Ruth Morris (another Nairne resident) will be editing together all the footage shot over the run of the show to produce a movie of the show. I will let you know when that's available and how to get hold of one.

Take Time out from your busy life to be an *artist!*

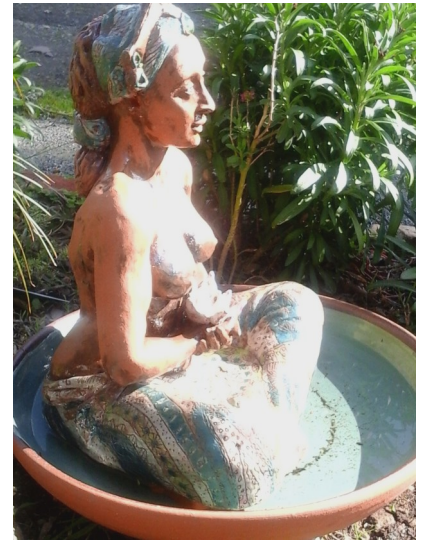

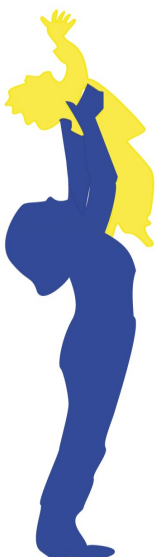

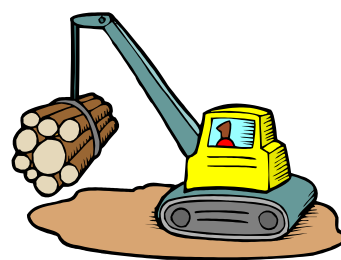

Illegal bike tracks damage Nairne's unique, native bush on Piney Ridge road



We are a small group of local volunteers with Trees for Life's Bush for Life (BFL) program. Together, our weed control work on Nairne's Piney Ridge Road BFL site ('Piney') is assisting the recovery of its unique native plants. So it is distressing when Piney is frequently the location for illegal dumping of garden waste and other rubbish, its soil habitat degraded when fallen twigs and branches are removed for firewood, and, most damaging, the recent illegal bike track construction through the precious site.

Since its 1830s beginnings, Nairne has been a productive little settlement, with a rich hinterland ideal for livestock, crops, even a mining boom. In its early days, this involved clearing Nairne's surrounding unique bushland. Today only tiny pockets remain.

The Piney Ridge roadside is one of these, with about 50 native species still there since pre-settlement. Piney begins quietly, on its west spear grass with its windswept winter 'hair'. Eastside grows kangaroo and wallaby grass between clusters of introduced *pinus radiata*. Hidden in these grasses are pimelea (rice flowers) and pink convolvus, its little vines climbing the grass stems. Then the west becomes a rich little woodland of flowering groundcovers including *kennedia* (running postman) and *pultenaea pedunculata* (matted bush pea), native plantain, lilies, the delicate and rare native wheat grass, and scented sun orchid. *Acacia retinodes*, manna and blue gum create a dappled shade. Further north *pultenaea* spills down its eastern ridges, and she-oaks grow above chocolate and vanilla lilies. Its quiet beauty emerges most in spring, with a lovely display of lavender, white, cream, yellow, pink, and red flowers, in some places masses of colour tumbling over ridges.

Each section of Piney has a unique mix of plants rarely replicated elsewhere. How special is that! Piney's environmental significance is recognised by Mt Barker District Council, State Government, and Trees for Life's Bush for Life (BFL) Program. You can see BFL and Council site signs on the left as you enter Piney from North Road. We've noticed an increase of local people walking Piney or riding bikes on its undulating road. Many would enjoy Piney's springtime flowers.

Like most remnant bushland it has many threats, including weeds. As BFL volunteers, we are trained bushcarers, mostly Nairne residents. Over the past 9 years we've worked over 1000 hours controlling invasive weeds from Piney in all seasons. The work is rewarding, with native species becoming more abundant, some reappearing, such as the Grass Tree and Scented Sun Orchid.

We felt greatly distressed in recent weeks that, by widening and deepening an illicit cycle track on Piney, someone has dug up native plants, soil and rocks and with these, smothered native groundcovers, lilies, grasses, and baby trees along the illicit track's edges. One of Piney's three Grass Trees was so damaged it is now dead. A site sign was removed, and found damaged some metres away. The worry and anguish of all this is hard for us to bear.

We sympathise with cyclists looking for interesting local tracks. Outdoor activity is what young people need to counter hours of screen-watching. Unfortunately, apart from damaging all roadsides being illegal, you have illegally damaged a particularly precious roadside verge. So please bike riders, help us volunteers protect Nairne's lovely, rare bush plants and flowers on Piney for our community's future enjoyment, and approach Council for another suitable site for off-road cycling.

The Hills Fleurieu Police would like to thank the Nairne News for again allowing us the opportunity to inform its readers of information which they may find useful. The Hills Fleurieu Police would like to work together with the Nairne News and the community to ensure that the Hills Area is a safe place to live, visit and do business.

Unfortunately we have had several house breaks in our Local Service Area. So I thought that it was a good time to again give you some ideas on how to make it more difficult for thieves to break into your homes or farms.

HOME SECURITY

To reduce the opportunity for thieves to gain entry into your home, please consider the following crime prevention security tips.

- Ensure appropriate keyed locks are fitted to all doors and windows.

- Even when you are outside, be sure to lock all doors and windows.

- Lock gates, garages and sheds when not in use.

- Keep trees and bushes in front of doors and windows trimmed to avoid being used as hiding places.

- Install and activate an alarm system.

Lock all garden tools and ladders away securely so they cannot be used to break into your home.
Don't leave valuables in obvious places. Thieves often target jewellery in jewellery boxes on bedroom dressers and other valuables in bedside drawers and cupboards.
Break down packaging of expensive items and place it in your bin. Don't leave it next to your bin on the street.
Lock your meter box to prevent thieves interfering with your power supply (contact your local electricity provider for more information).

Use an engraver, ultra violet (UV) pen or microdots to mark property.
UV pens are best used for items that cannot be engraved e.g. ceramics, antiques etc.
Mark your valuables with your driver's licence number, prefixed by the letter 'S' for South Australia e.g. S123456.
Photograph jewellery with a ruler beside it to give an indication of the actual size.

Record all details of valuable property and keep this in a safe place.

FARM SECURITY

Rural Property Address (RPA) Number / Property Name

The RPA number and property name should be prominently displayed at the front of your property. This will assist emergency services and others to locate the property in emergency situations. You will be surprised at the amount of time that is spent by police continually driving up and down the road looking for the right address.

Fences and Gates

Regularly check the condition of the boundary fences and gates. Pay attention to slack wiring and investigate the cause. Repair damaged fences as soon as possible. Contact the police if the fences appear to have been deliberately cut or tampered with.
Mount gates securely to strong posts at entrances to the property and other high risk areas and lock with heavy duty chains and padlocks when not in use.

Windows

External windows and frames should be of solid construction and anchored to the building to prevent easy removal.
Windows should be fitted with quality locks and kept locked when not in use.
Some styles of windows can be locked in a partially open position. Further advice on these items can be obtained from your insurance company or locksmith.
Skylights should be kept locked, particularly at night.
Glass doors and windows should be reinforced to restrict unauthorised access. Existing glass can be reinforced internally with a shatter resistant adhesive film, or replaced with laminated glass.
Consider installing metal security grilles or shutters on windows (caution: these can trap occupants in an emergency such as a fire if not properly installed).

New funding for community projects to reduce violence against women

The Australian Government is inviting not-for-profit organisations, local community groups and local governments to apply for grants to help deliver projects that will reduce violence against women.

Applicants can apply for up to \$150,000 over two financial years through the Government's *Building Safe Communities for Women and their Children* initiative, to fund one-off projects that address domestic violence in our local communities.

Total funding of up to \$4 million is available from 1 October 2015 to 30 September 2017.

This funding will help our local organisations come together to respond to and support women and their children who are experiencing violence.

Everyone, whether as individuals, through organisations, or the community as a whole, has a responsibility to recognise violence against women and its impact, and be prepared to act.

Organisations such as community groups, sporting bodies, youth organisations, schools and faith groups can all play an important role in improving safety for women and their children.

The Australian Government understands that domestic violence affects different women in different ways and, as such, innovative and original solutions must be sourced from communities across the country.

Grants can be used to develop a range of practical solutions for dealing with issues of domestic violence in their community. Projects could focus on local engagement to raise awareness about the impacts of violence against women, or building partnerships to better respond to the needs of women experiencing violence.

Importantly, successful organisations will publish and share information about their experiences and outcomes of their project. This will create a valuable resource for communities right across Australia.

This funding is an Australian Government initiative under the *National Plan to Reduce Violence against Women and their Children 2010-2022*. It builds on the partnership between governments and communities to reduce violence against women and their children. The funding is not intended for ongoing service delivery.

The Australian Government will soon be calling for Round 4 Green Army project applications and on 19 August 2015, interested parties have the opportunity to attend an information session to learn how to get involved.

Is there an environmental or conservation project in your region that would benefit from practical, on-ground support?

Are you aged between 17 and 24 years, and interested in gaining practical training and experience while working in your local environment? Or do you know someone who might be?

If so, come along to an information session at the Mercure Grosvenor Hotel in Adelaide and find out about the Australian Government's Green Army program.

Right across Australia, the Green Army is making a real difference to the environment and local communities through projects such as restoring and protecting habitat, weeding, planting, cleaning up creeks and rivers and restoring cultural heritage places.

Locally, in the Mayo electorate, we have had thirteen approved Green Army projects across Rounds 1, 2 and 3, at various locations throughout the central Adelaide Hills, Kangaroo Island and the Fleurieu Peninsula.

The Green Army will become Australia's largest-ever team supporting environmental action across the country, building to 15,000 young Australians by 2018.

So far, more than 700 projects have been announced since the program commenced in 2014, with more than 330 projects already rolled out across Australia.

With the call for Round 4 Green Army projects opening soon, the information session will provide details on how individuals can get involved and how groups can apply for projects.

Representatives from the Department of the Environment will be available to answer questions.

Round 4 of the Green Army will consist of two streams. Stream 1 will focus on heritage projects that promote, protect and conserve Australia's National and World Heritage which are listed for their natural, historic or Indigenous values.

Stream 2 will focus on projects that directly support the protection and recovery of threatened species, particularly actions for improving habitat.

For organisations interested in hosting a project, a **Project Host Information Session** will be held in Adelaide at the Mercure Grosvenor Hotel on 19 August from 9 am – 11 am.

A **Participant Information Session** for 17 - 24 year olds who are interested in joining the Green Army, will be held at the same location on 19 August, from 11 am – 1 pm.

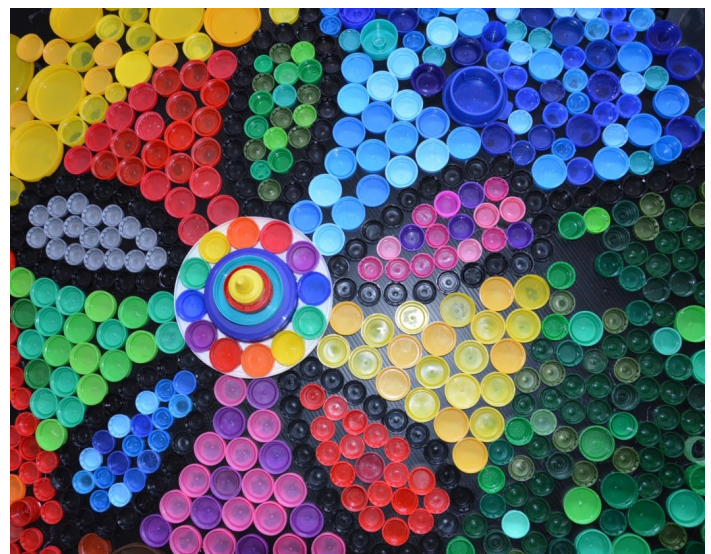

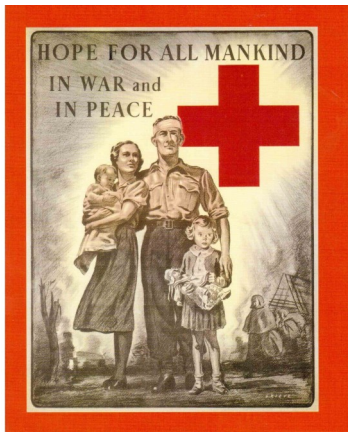

Australian Red Cross, Nairne Branch

The contents of an article from The Mt Barker Courier dated 18 September 1914 reveals that The Nairne Red Cross Branch was formed on 11 September 1914. Please find a copy of that article below.

Nairne: September 11

A local branch of the Red Cross Society has been formed here. Mrs Dow is the president & Mrs P.G Paech vice-president. Miss Milne was appointed treasurer, and Mrs Geo. Chapman, and Mrs Hare joint secretaries. About £15 has been collected, and a successful concert was held on Saturday evening last, when the takings were £11 5/. A good start financially, therefore, has been made. The concert was held in the Odd-fellow's Hall and presided over by the chairman of the District Council (dr W. J. Han-nam) who opened the entertainment with a few well chosen remarks explaining the objects of the Society. Mr. Schmitz and the Rev. R. Broadbent gave short patriotic addresses, and a much appreciated program was contributed to by visiting and local ladies and gentlemen, including the Hahndorf Ladies Choral Society. The audience was a very large one for Nairne. The National Anthem was sung both at the opening and the closing of the entertainment.

The Nairne Branch operated until the end of World War 1 in 1919. It then reformed on 27 September 1939 at the commencement of World War 2.

The Nairne Red Cross Circle minute book from that time shows that Mr A Mills, Councillor for North Nairne Ward was in the chair & others present were : Mesdames Barrett, Collins, W. May, Duke, Parry, Squires, Jenner, J. H. Watts, Mumford, Hutton, Huxley, Howard, Jury, Paterson, K. Gee, Day, A. Milne, C. Williams, R. M. Shepphard, F. Jackson, N. Timmins, Orr, Trigg, Brice, F.G. Hains, W.F. Milne, B. Strout & Misses L. Semmens, L Bayfield. N. Bolto, R. Jury, Q. Watts, B. May, R. Thiem, R Basham, V. Glastonbury, P Brice, A. Watts & R. Watts.

The Nairne Red Cross Branch has been in operation continuously since 27 September 1939 and has been very active both in times of war and peace.

If you would like to be part of this fine tradition please think about becoming a Nairne Red Cross branch member. We meet at 1:30 pm on the first Wednesday of each month at the Nairne Unit-ing Church Hall on Allargue Street. We would welcome you warmly. The annual cost is \$5.00 and you would be able to take advantage of the discounts that are offered from time to time to attend training offered by the Red Cross, for example First Aid training. Your membership could take the form of 'A Friend of the Nairne Branch' if you did not want to be an active branch member but share the values of the International Red Cross. You would not have to do anything, ie attend meetings or help with fundraising, but would still be able to benefit from the training discount offers. 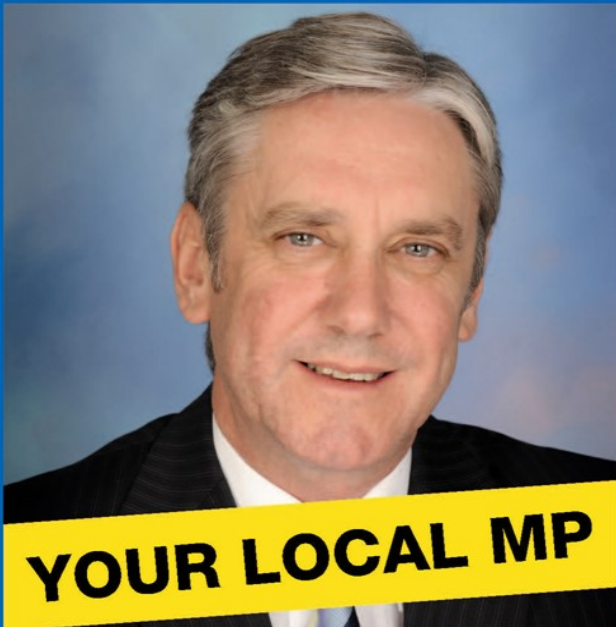
