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PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2016/17

The following report was tabled at the Annual General Meeting of the Nairne & District Residents' Association Incorporated on Wednesday August 16th 2017. It is reproduced here in full.

It was an honour to have been elected President of the Nairne & District Residents' Association (NDRA) at the start of this year and to have had the opportunity to continue the great work of Simon

Martin before me. Under Simon's leadership, the NDRA was a strong and effective voice for Nairne, with a collaborative relationship with Council and stakeholders and an excellent reputation for achieving good outcomes for the town. I would like to pay tribute to Simon for handing over the leadership of the NDRA in such a good position and for setting the benchmark for my term.

The Nairne & Environs Development Plan Amendment - our greatest achievement

This year began with the finalisation of the Nairne & Environs Development Plan Amendment (DPA), the culmination of eight years of work. The plan is good for Nairne and reflects what comes out of a process where residents, the NDRA, Council and government, work together for a result that satisfies all parties, but most of all the people of Nairne. The NDRA took a strident position against the proposal to extend the town boundary to the west, but was similarly vocal in its support for the redevelopments of the Chapmans site and the Main Street. We also worked with Council to modify the plans for the mixed use zone near the corner of Old Princes Highway and Woodside Road to ensure that it complemented the plans for the Main Street and Chapmans and reflected the needs of the community.

Final approval of the DPA by the Minister for Planning was given in May 2017.

Exciting improvements about to happen in our Main Street

At the same time that the DPA was finalised, the plans for the first stage of the Main Street development were unveiled. The discussion led by Council with the NDRA and

the community continued over six months before the final plans were presented to a meeting attended by about 30 members and residents. As with all such projects, it has been impossible to gain 100% agreement, but through a detailed and sustained consultation process, we arrived at a point where all were informed and most were satisfied. We look forward to this stage beginning in the Spring and then the further stages as they are approved by Council.

NDRA meetings have been varied and interesting

Our monthly meetings have seen a steady increase in attendance. The bi-monthly Councillors' forum has proven a popular opportunity for community members to learn about the work of Council and to ask specific questions about Nairne. We are fortunate to have four North Ward Councillors who take these forums seriously with their attendance and preparation. We have also focussed on interesting and relevant topics and guest speakers, including the development of the Chapmans site, the Economic Development Plan for the district, the Main Street master plan and Adelaide Hills Tourism. The presentation by the developers of the Chapmans site was our most popular meeting, with over 60 residents filling the Uniting Church Hall. In April, we supported a community forum by the Member for Mayo, Rebekha Sharkie, by making the event an official NDRA meeting. We also assisted the Liberal candidate for Kavel, Dan Cregan, in convening a meeting to discuss the traffic congestion at the corner of Old Princes Highway and Woodside Road.

Nairne News does our community proud

A new Nairne News editorial team have taken great steps to improve the quality and presentation of the publication. I am very proud of how Nairne News represents the NDRA and the brand of Nairne. I would like to thank and acknowledge Kerri Oakley, Ruth Morris, Ariel Elliott-Potter, Tianna Easther and Margaret Vincent for their work in publishing and distributing Nairne News. I would also like to thank the businesses of Nairne for giving prominent space in their premises to sell the publication.

We also activated the NDRA Facebook page, with up to five new posts a week of information relevant to the scope of the NDRA. Over the year, we grew the number of followers from 150 to 675, enabling us to reach more people with our agenda. There were plans to improve the Nairne website, but this is a big task and despite having a volunteer to do the technical work, this is a plan to be deferred to the next year.

Three great events supported by the NDRA and enjoyed by the community

The NDRA sponsored three events during the year. The first Nairne Art Alive event in October, which was conceived by Alison Brown, was a successful gathering of local working artists in the Main Street. With ongoing nurturing and promotion, the NDRA believes this has the potential to be a strong event in support of our substantial local arts community.

In December, the NDRA took over the management and staging of the annual Carols by the Lake from the Nairne Lions Club. The event on December 10th 2016 was deemed to be the most successful and popular ever and in 2017, the NDRA will be supported by Nairne Lions and the Hills Family Church to stage an even better event, focusing on traditional Christmas music and songs. I would like to acknowledge Debs Buchmann and the group of NDRA volunteers she led to organise the 2016 event and to thank those who have volunteered to bring together the 2017 event. This is perhaps now the most significant and consistently successful community event in Nairne.

In July the NDRA received funding from the Mount Barker District Council to conduct a Main Street Parade and Treasure Hunt preceding the annual Family Film Night. The purpose of the funding was to conduct an event that would promote and engage Main Street businesses with the community. Fifty children, dressed as animals to reflect the theme of the movie, with their carers and NDRA volunteers, walked the Main Street and visited businesses to collect treasures and special offers. The film event that followed in the Soldiers Memorial Hall was attended by 160 people, with much positive feedback. I would like to acknowledge Brett Gabel and Annette Gladigau for their work in organising the grant and the event for the NDRA. Further funding was approved for an exciting permanent activation project in the Main Street for which details will be announced later in 2017.

Major improvements already in place

At the start of the year the last of the interpretive plaques was installed to complete the trail of eleven plaques, starting in Byethorne Park and continuing at significant sites along the Main Street. The plaques tell the story of buildings, locations and events that are part of the heritage of the town and perfectly complement the murals. We were delighted when during the year Endeavour Tours, which specialises in short and day trips for retirees, made a visit to Nairne and a tour of the historic sites, one of their regular itineraries. NDRA volunteers would meet and board the bus to describe the various locations, after which the travellers had lunch in the Main Street.

The opening of the Bald Hills interchange on the South Eastern Freeway in September 2016 has brought significant change and opportunity to Nairne. Residents can now access the major centres of Adelaide and Murray Bridge, without the delay of travelling via Littlehampton. This opens up the opportunity to attract visitors and services directly to Nairne and to market the ease of access to potential residents. One immediate flow-on to the economy was an increase in the value of local property prices.

In February 2017, the Star Gate sculpture was installed in Mick Murphy Park. The sculpture forms part of the Adelaide Hills Sculpture Trail, which connects towns across the community through the Adelaide Hills International Sculpture Symposium.

Much of the work of the NDRA happens in the background. We receive a constant stream of queries and information via telephone, post, email and Facebook that are efficiently dealt with. In some ways, being a co-ordinator and facilitator between residents and stakeholders, is one of the most important functions of the NDRA. The engine room of the NDRA is our Secretary Annette Gladigau. Annette is a skilled Secretary, but what makes her work so valuable is her passion for Nairne and the work of the NDRA. I cannot overstate what a pillar of support and hard work Annette has been. I would also like to acknowledge and thank Deb Gabel who held the role of Treasurer. Astute and efficient financial management is very important to a community organisation and Deb never failed to give good advice, report accurately and ensure that all our financial obligations were met. She was also key in working with the Nairne News team to audit the invoicing system and establish better protocols and systems.

Towards the end of the year, following a presentation by Adelaide Hills Tourism at an NDRA meeting, the NDRA formed a Nairne Tourism Task Force, comprising local tourism operators and stakeholders. Their role will be to develop a tourism plan and vision for Nairne that will establish our identity as a tourism destination. I would like to thank Leif Brown for volunteering to lead the establishment of this group.

Many people with the NDRA membership have stepped up to take on various tasks and to support our efforts throughout the year. I have only specifically mentioned the Secretary and Treasurer because of their key roles, but everyone who has contributed has been appreciated. Volunteering to make a difference to people, is the foundation of a great community and I thank every person who has volunteered for the NDRA and has taken on various large and small tasks.

Unity is our most significant challenge for the coming year

Nairne is no different to any community where the pool of available volunteers is small, but the agenda is large. We value every person and group who can help us achieve our goal of furthering the social, cultural and economic prosperity of Nairne, no matter how big or small their contribution.

Our biggest challenge in the coming year is unity, both within the community and the NDRA. The whole community must work together to understand, support and complement the goals of the various organisations that give us the lifestyle, culture and facilities that we value. If we are to make Nairne a successful community, all agendas need to be aligned and all people united. This need for unity starts with the membership of the NDRA. Working together with respect, collaboration and humility will make our town great. The broad objectives of the NDRA mean that we have a responsibility as the bastion of unity and leadership for Nairne, so how we conduct and present our association is an important example to others.

I would like to congratulate and wish well the leadership and office holders of the NDRA in the coming year and thank the members and the community for working with me to make this past year a successful one.

HOPE Ride for Water

A group of ten cyclists rode from Nairne to Mildura Victoria over 5 days in April to support the work of local charity Australia HOPE International.

This was the second 'HOPE Ride' organized by keen local cyclists Andrew Day and Sid Farrow, following an initial group ride from Nairne to Mt Gambier last year. Departing from the Jambo Sana Tea Rooms in the main street of Nairne on Sunday 23 April, the team was joined by a further 24 cyclists, for the first stage to Murray Bridge.



The project targeted for this year's event was to provide a bore for clean, safe drinking water to a primary school community in North West Uganda.

Cycling team member, Narelle Simons who visited the Bwika

HOPE Primary School with Australia HOPE International in 2016 described the water as 'milky coloured' and explained that the children had to carry it in plastic jerry cans approximately 3km each day from the closest water source.

Symbolic of the cause, the route for this year's ride loosely followed the Murray River upstream, visiting the towns of Mannum, Swan Reach, Loxton, Renmark and Lake Cullulleraine.

Generous support from family, friends and the local community saw the team fundraising goal exceeded with a total of \$16,700 being raised.

Drilling for the bore has now proceeded and in addition, extra classrooms will be installed at the Bwika

What would Charles Hawker Do?



My Political Hero and his Legacy

In 1938 Charles Hawker's death shocked the nation: John Curtin, then Opposition Leader, said he thought Hawker was on the threshold of great achievements.

Hawker died in the Kyeema air-crash. His name is not well remembered now. The youngest Minister in the Lyons Cabinet, Hawker carried extraordinary physical scars from the First World War. Crippled and partly blinded on the Western Front, Hawker's left eye was replaced with a glass ball. After many painful operations, he taught himself to walk again.

A past Premier told me that if Charles Hawker had lived another ten years, he would have been a household name. He was, the Premier said, much better liked than Bob Menzies. Fate is a cruel thing, but Hawker, a survivor of the Western Front, would have understood how cruel it can be.

For a number of university applicants, including myself several years ago, Charles Hawker meant everything. His sister invested Hawker's estate in a scholarship fund and that fund put me and others through university. At that time my step-mum had advanced MS. There were three other children still at school and one income in the house. I know I wouldn't have made it to university without the scholarship. Later, I was able to follow in Charles' footsteps at Cambridge University. Walking down to his college from my own, and standing in his room, was a deeply moving experience, not least because, broken by the war, Charles Hawker had somehow managed to graduate.

Charles was frank, outspoken and utterly fearless in politics. In the years of the Depression he resigned from Cabinet in opposition to rising members' salaries and at a time when free-trade was unpopular, fought hard to win new markets for farmers.

I owe a great deal to Hawker. Following his example, I have made three important commitments: I won't drive a government car if I'm elected. Our state is broke and I don't want to ride around on the backs of South Australians. I'll fly economy class on state business for the same reason. I'll also contribute ten percent of my parliamentary entitlements to causes that I care deeply about and want to support in Kavel. Naturally, all good MPs are the sponsor of various causes in their electorate and I hope to do the same if elected.

Beyond financial assistance, Charles Hawker's legacy is a simple one: when things get tough I like to ask myself this question – what would Charles Hawker do? It's an important question and the real measure of his legacy.

If you would like help out we would gladly accept any squares you would like to donate. You need to use 8 ply wool or acrylic and size 4mm needles. Cast on 38 stitches and using plain stitch continue until you have a square, usually about 76 rows. *Tip: You can fold it over, into a triangle, to check the sides are of equal length before you cast off.*

ST. JAMES BLAKISTON NEWSLETTER

St. James Church was built in 1847. It was, at that time, the first church built outside the city of Adelaide.

Captain Frances Davison, who came to Australia in December 1839 was the principal founder and with his wife Elizabeth and two children settled in this district which named Blakiston after the ancient seat of his family.

Davison kept a diary from 1839 to 1847 and from this we learn that services were held in his barn, or at times in his dining room, by the colonial chaplain, CB Howard and others.

In 1846 Rev. James Pollitt, formerly a missionary in the West Indies, arrived with his wife and four children from England, having been sent by the Society of the Propagation of the Gospel to minister in this district. He called on the then governor, Gov. Robe and requested assistance.

He was promised a grant of land for church purposes. At the end of June that year, Davison, Pollitt and Benjamin Gray measured the land given by George Morphet and Samuel Stock for the site of the church.

It is amazing to note that less than one year later, in fact 10 months on 28th April 1847 the church was built and ready for worship.

Rev. Pollitt, the first priest also carved the font (which is still in use) from the same stone as that used for the building. The font was first used for the baptism of his daughter.

The Rectory built alongside was built and occupied by the 15th December that year and has been occupied ever since.

There is much history about the church and the surrounding cemetery but we must never lose sight of the main purpose of this building. It is a place of worship and to be quiet in that place is to be in a haven of peace.

There are services held at 8.30am on the second and fourth Sundays of each month, and a happy fellowship group meet for outings and activities on the first Thursday of each month. We welcome YOU to join us.

It's Hip to Microchip

That moment when you realise your beloved pet has escaped and is now lost is a terrifying one. That sinking feeling in your stomach is then made even worse if you realise their microchip details are not up to date, or worse yet, your pet doesn't even have a microchip.

Microchips provide an invaluable link between you and your pet that goes with them regardless of whether they are wearing their collar. They are a small electronic implant, about the size of a grain of rice, placed between the shoulder blades that provide a code when scanned.

However, this code and the link from your pet to you is as tenuous as its records. If you don't keep your contact details up to date then reuniting you

to your pet can be sometimes be more difficult than you think. This is why it is so important to register the microchip with one of the Australian databases and keep your details up to date with the registry if anything changes.

As of July 1st 2018, new laws in South Australia will require your cat or dog to be microchipped. For cats and dogs born after this date there are also requirements for desexing on the way. If you have any concerns about your pets microchip we can simply scan it at your next visit to the clinic.

Stand for Byethorne Land

At the meeting on Wednesday July 19th 2017, the NDRA agreed to oppose the possibility of a sale of the unmade road adjacent to Byethorne Park known as Packard Street East. The NDRA asked that the land be retained by Council and incorporated to Byethorne Park. The NDRA also expressed concern to Council about some unclear aspects of the consultation that several residents raised at the meeting.

At the time of publication the consultation period had closed and signage had been removed. Mount Barker District Council had received numerous submissions from the community, including the adjoining residents and the NRDA.

The whole process had been confusing for residents, with the notice and signage stating “close and retain”. From the wording on the notice, residents did not see the risk of it being sold, and therefore originally there were no submissions made. Thankfully, additional consultation time was granted after raising the issue that there was no signage at the location. However, the notice was not amended and residents were still confused regarding the matter.

It has been by word of mouth and social media that Council's intention to remove the Community land classification and consider selling the land after the unmade road is closed was highlighted.

The land offers a rare opportunity to expand Byethorne Park in relation to the growth of Nairne. Social media discussions reflect that the majority are in favour of preserving the land as part of Byethorne Park.

Further to the Council meeting held on August


7th, the Council has acknowledged there were some errors in their community engagement process. They are now undertaking a review, which they hope to complete by the next council meeting on the September 4th, 2017, which will introduce a new community engagement process that is clear and effective.

Passionate residents of Nairne, alongside the Nairne and District Residents Association, and the power of social media has prevented a premature development decision that may have resulted in the loss of valuable open public space.

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





Bus Service Proposal for Nairne, Kanmantoo, Callington, Woodchester & Strathalbyn

A proposal by Stephen Lucas on behalf of the communities of Nairne, Kanmantoo, Callington & Strathalbyn

I have 30 years experience working in the public transport industry and for over a decade was involved with timetabling and service design, a skill that I cherish and use to put forward proposals for alterations to various public transport services. Recently I presented a proposal for improving bus services to Nairne, Brukunga, Kanmantoo, Callington & Strathalbyn to the Nairne & District Residents' Association which was received with enthusiasm from members and other residents in the community.

The proposal focuses on the Communities to the East of Mount Barker encompassing Littlehampton, Nairne, Brukunga, Dawesley, Kanmantoo, Callington, Woodchester & Strathalbyn.

The main trunk route from Adelaide to Mount Barker via Stirling, Bridgewater and Hahndorf is very well serviced by numerous efficient bus services. Sadly though, this does not extend to other areas of the Adelaide Hills which, in the most part, are forgotten.

The farthest point from the Adelaide CBD of Adelaide Metro services is the Sellicks Beach terminus of Route 750 which is approximately 55kms from the CBD and I believe that all areas within this boundary should be serviced by regular Adelaide Metro services. The service to Sellicks Beach and its counterpart that operates through McLaren Vale and Willunga run 7 days a week to a basic hourly timetable. I would like to see something similar materialise in our region, which is closer to the CBD and has a population base in excess of 17,000 which is considerably larger than those areas previously mentioned in the southern suburbs.

The State Government must be commended for spending big money on transport infrastructure, however, they have forgotten about the day to day services and in particular have neglected bus services in outer suburbs. It is up to us as a community to voice our concerns to Government via our local representatives. In building the proposed timetable I have been mindful to keep the projected cost to a minimum, but there needs to be some added expenditure on bus services.

The proposal will see buses operating through Nairne in both directions via Woodside Rd, North Rd, Junction St & Old Princes Hwy. Services will operate through Littlehampton to Nairne hourly (more frequent in peak hour) with a 60-90 minute frequency from Nairne-Callington-Strathalbyn with some late night and early morning services also provided.

Approximately four round trips per day have been proposed to operate to Brukunga with further plans to extend it to Harrogate, but that is another story for another day.

The timetable has been designed to ensure there is an efficient connection to and from CITY buses at Mount Barker / Dumas Street. Importantly for students there are numerous transfer opportunities for transfers to school buses at either Mount Barker or Crafers. These school buses operate to Heathfield High, Oakbank Area School, Mitcham Girls, Mercedes College, Concordia, Urrbrae, Unley High, Annesley College, Pembroke College and numerous others.

There will be significant transfer opportunities at Callington with the LinkSA service to Murray Bridge via Monarto Zoo.

In this issue I would like to remind people about Vehicle Security and Scams.

Unfortunately in every Local Service Area of South Australia theft of items from motor vehicles is still continuing to be a problem. Thieves will look into vehicles to see what items can be easily stolen and even a small amount of cash in the centre console could make you the target.

By following these simple security tips you can minimise theft from your vehicle:-

- Ensure all valuables are removed from your vehicle or conceal them in the boot of the vehicle before arriving at your destination.
- Lock your vehicle doors and close windows.
- Install an audible alarm.
- At night park your vehicle in a well-lit area.
- Engrave your valuables with your driver's licence number prefixed with an "S" for South Australia.
- Park your vehicle in a garage at night where possible.
- Avoid hiding a second set of keys in the vehicle – if the vehicle is broken into they may find the keys and take the car as well as your valuables.
- Avoid placing bags and wallets on the passenger seat where they could be easily stolen.

It's now tax time and the Hills Fleurieu Police are still having reports of victims being contacted by persons reporting to be from the Australian Tax Office. These people sound very convincing and are aggressive and intimidating. They threaten taxpayers with arrest and legal action unless they comply with requests. The scammer will then usually request that the taxpayer pay by unorthodox means in one instance they have told people to buy iTunes cards to pay for their outstanding debt. This is a scam just hang up.

A scam is a dishonest act where someone may trick you into parting with your money or obtaining information about you that can be used in other criminal ways. (Phishing) Scammers can be very convincing and invent seemingly legitimate reasons to make you part with your money or information. Scammers will contact a person through emails, phone calls, text messages or letters.

To reduce your chances of becoming a victim of a scam, please consider the following crime prevention tips:

- Always know who you are communicating with and where your information is going. If you are uncertain, confirm the contact is legitimate through methods other than what they have provided.
- Never give your personal details, passwords, credit card or online account details to a person you cannot identify in an official capacity.
- Legitimate companies, particularly financial institutions will not send emails requesting you to log on to a link – log on independently if you need to access that site.
- Ignore emails and text messages which advise you have won a competition that you did not enter.
- Do not send money to receive lottery winnings or to claim a prize.
- Never give an unsolicited person remote access to your computer. You may compromise the security of your device and your personal information.
- Ensure your computer is protected with regularly updated anti-virus and anti-spyware software.

Please share this information among your friends and community – education is a key weapon against would-be scammers.


